

Directions to the cottage:

Take 31 towards Ludington. Use Whitehall/Montague exit. Turn right & go straight thru town, down the hill, over the causeway, & up the hill on Dowling St. (We will have GVA signs at all of the turns from here on.) Turn left onto Lau Road towards Medbury Park and the Channel. Go over the bridge. Take 1st 2-track after the bridge. Stay right at the forks in the two track. If you prefer to follow the lake shore you can take an altenate route which is: turn left at the beginning of Dowling and follow the lake around on the Old Channel Trail, eventually turning left onto Lau Rd. It takes about an hour from the GVA gallery.

Bring your camera and/or art supplies.

We are the 6th house north of the pier, channel, and lighthouse , so you can walk or drive to paint the White River Lighthouse which is across the channel. You could set up an easel on the pier and paint people, boats, landscape, or the lighthouse, or just take pictures for reference. If it rains, some people could paint from my studio or from the balcony of my studio overlooking Lake Michigan.

Almost Free, But Not Quite!

The best things in life are not always free; one of them costs \$40 per year, with a modest increase expected soon. This is the price members of Grand Valley Artists currently pay—primarily to maintain the place that many of us consider a home away from home.

Because GVA is run by volunteers, we don't actually have "staff," but we do need to cover the cost of renting and maintaining the facility we require in order to provide a regular schedule of activities for our members. Some of our events must be subsidized, too; your dues support everything from flat fees for sketch sessions involving models to artists' receptions for exhibitions, while "hidden" expenses include a steady supply of paper products, repair or replacement of furnishings, and services or equipment essential to the technology on which we rely for communication or presentation of information.

Our dues have remained the same for many years; to guarantee the level of customer service expected by members while having the flexibility to offer fresh opportunities, the decision was made to raise the individual membership fee by the amount typically charged at a single sketch session featuring a model: \$5. Effective October 1st, 2019, standard individual memberships will be \$45 per year; additional family members may still be added for 50% (\$22.50).

GVA's 2019–2020 "membership year" officially begins September 1st. Beginning August 1st, renewals and new memberships will continue to be available at the "old" rate (\$40)—for a limited time. Existing members are encouraged to renew via the GVA website ("Artists: Join Here!"), by mail using the paper forms available at the studio, or in person (as the Membership Chair usually is present at board meetings that precede Critique as well as at selected sketch sessions). Speaking of Free.....

Our Pandora account is not free, but I thought that headline would get your attention. Now for the ulterior motive. We ask that members refrain from messing with the little laptop that we use to enjoy music in the sketch room — leave that up to the sketch coordinators. If you have a music request, just ask them to find it for you. We have been having problems because people are logging us off, switching to their own Pandora accounts, or somehow disabling everything altogether! Also, IF you are Lucy Diamond or know who she is, please ask her to refrain from logging into her own Pandora account. This has repeatedly created problems





We do not share the password to that account because we don't want anybody using our account outside of GVA, as that could result in us being unable to listen to it ourselves!

A trip to the Upper Peninsula by Steve Scarborough

A couple weeks ago, Linda and I had a chance to go to the UP for the weekend. Munising has 17 waterfalls, plus the Pictured Rocks, which run along the south edge of Lake Superior, stretching 45 miles along the shoreline and ranging in height from 50 to 200 feet above the water. If all this wasn't enough, on the way home, we planned to see Tahquamenon Falls, which are really two waterfalls in one, an upper half and a lower half.

Crossing the Mackinaw Bridge is always exciting, and luckily it was calm the day we crossed it. I always worry about getting blown off into Lake Michigan!


Making a few stops along the way, we reached Munising by late afternoon and immediately went on a search for pasties. Luckily for us, I had to wait another day to have one and one is quite enough, I have to say. After checking in to our hotel, we were told that this weekend was 'Yooper Days', where all the locals can ride the boats



to Pictured Rocks for free. The lady at the desk seemed to think I was going to face a lot of crowds and wished us well and even suggested I postpone our boat ride. There was also a huge fair in town and she said parking was going to be difficult.

Luckily, being from Grand Rapids, we have experienced crowds that dwarf anything Munising can throw at us, and we enjoyed the fair that was along the waterfront that weekend and had no problem parking at all. Also, the boat company had boats for paying customers separate from the locals, so we boarded with ease.

As we walked from booth to booth at the Yooper Fair, we ran into a fellow GVA member, Mike Carrier, who had a booth set up at the fair. He told us that we were going to have a terrific time on the tour of Pictured Rocks seeing as how it was an uncommonly calm and warm day. He and Evie had a very cold and windy ride the last time they went on the boat tour, so we felt everything was going our way.



Linda and I took a seat on the top of the boat and soon were taking pictures as fast as we could of the amazing beauty of Pictured Rocks. In all, we took 2,200 photographs that weekend, of the park, waterfalls, and other landscapes we encountered on our trip.

As we toured the cliffs along the shoreline, we heard everyone gasp and saw a man, haphazardly hanging from a thick rope tied to a tree hanging about 50 feet above the water. It was immediately obvious that he was no experienced climber. He was dressed in only a pair of cut off jeans, no shirt, no shoes, no safety harness and without a helper.

I couldn't tell if he was trying to go up or down, but one thing was certain, he was in trouble and as he scrambled up back to the top, rocks fell away from the edge into the water and everyone on the boat held their breath until he made it back up to the top.

Selfishly, I sat there taking pictures of his dilemma. To my credit, I



vowed to donate all money for the shots of him falling into the water to charity. Luckily, I didn't have to—he made it back up and, I assume, didn't try that trick again.

After the exciting boat ride, we went on a tour of waterfalls and soon found that you needed a bottle of mosquito spray the size of a scuba tank to go into the woods in the UP. We found a store to get supplies and headed back out and captured some wonderful shots of various waterfalls and landscapes. Finding Au Train Falls was challenging, but we met an older lady out getting her mail who directed us, saying that they have changed the name of the road it was on and

no way would we find it without being from the area. It seemed we were having an abundance of good luck on this


trip!

After leaving Munising, we stopped at Tahquamenon Falls, where I hadn't been since I was 10 years old. We had to rent a row boat to go to an island to see completely around the lower falls. The water running down the river and falls is brown in color from the tannins which leach out of the cedar swamps surrounding the area. It was a taxing walk covering the whole grounds, and various walkways up and down the cliffs, but well worth it.

I would recommend to anyone to take a tour of the Upper Peninsula and especially the Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore, and to see as many of



the waterfalls as you can hike to. We found out later that if we'd kept going west, we would have seen even more waterfalls. Linda and I both got some good shots and hope to display them soon. In fact, we are already talking about going back!


