That way as members come to the meeting they will have the opportunity to view your artwork up close and experience it before the critique session begins.

Secondly, Randy Nyhof and others are working on a set of simple guidelines that will help us all with comments and suggestions for doing critiques of artwork. For some people this is a new process. For some it's a reminder. The main thing is, critiques not only help the person receiving the critique, we all learn how to improve our art. Hopefully there will be less silence and more conversation about what makes good art good!
